EVERY CHILD WE ENCOUNTER IS A DIVINE APPOINTMENT

We received a call from the District Children's Office (DCO) informing us that the children's court has committed a child, who is six years of age to our children's home. So I went to the court and I found a little girl, called Peris (name changed), looking very sad and fearful. After all the necessary procedures, the Judge handed her over to us. I took her to Holy Family Children's home, every one there came to welcome her. Soon after we gave her a good shower, cut her hair, dressed her with new clothes and then she joined us for lunch.

Next morning we visited Peris house, which was in a nearby slum. When we reached there we found the mother and her two other little children living in a small room. The mother shared her painful story, she was a married woman but now living with another man and she has three children from him. She works as a daily wager. Her two bigger daughters (from first husband) are with her mother for their moral safety. Peris is the first child born of the second man. The mother found Peris very sad, quite, and keeping herself aloof. Seeing this strange behavior, she asked her what was bothering her so with fear the child narrated that in the absence of the mother her father used to come back home from his job place and sexually abuse her and warning her not to report this incident to her mother. The father threatened the child that if she informed her mother, then he would kill both the mother and the child.



One day the Mother caught the father red-handed in the act and alerted the police and he was arrested. Thus the court decided to sent her to our Children's Home for care and protection. It is a fact that regardless of age or gender, the impact of sexual violence goes far beyond any physical injuries. We are counseling her, making her participate in home activities and help her make new friends. She feels much better now and feels at home. She seems to respond to the care she gets. She is in the nursery top class. After her 29 days of medical treatment we did the HIV test and found it negative. There are many such children who comes to our home with similar stories. "The best way to make children good is to make them happy." - Oscar Wilde

We have 110 children from a day old to 18 years. They are orphans, abandoned and abused. Children are also come due to family dispute and imprisonment of parents. The orphaned children are with us till primary school and then we keep them with guardians for home-based care. The abandoned children, if they are very young we try to find them adoptive parents thus they go for adoption. For children in crisis and any other issues, we seek help from the police, village elders, chiefs. If we find their relatives we reunites them with their families thus giving them a new life, love and joy to the family as well as to the children. In some cases the parents/relatives don't accept them. Mother Teresa said "to be discarded and unwanted is the worst experience that can befall a human being". Our home provides a safe shelter, nutritious food, medical care, love and family environment and schooling to these abandoned and destitute children. We are thankful to all our donors and supporters.

LITTLE CATHY AND HER DAUGHTER

Cathy (name changed) was the only daughter of her single mother, who lived in a little village far away from the capital city of Kenya. Poor and sick, the mother was unable to send Cathy to school. Cathy helped her mother in searching for daily bread, fetching water and firewood. Her mother became very ill and finally died leaving 12 years old Cathy orphaned. For Cathy, it was an experience of her world coming to an end and she wept not knowing of her tomorrow! On the funeral day of her beloved mother, her aunt who came from Nairobi advised her to come along with her promising that she would send her to school. Indeed, Cathy once again was filled with hope that she will have a better future!

After coming to the city, her aunt did not keep her promise rather made her work in her house as a maid. The aunt used to work elsewhere leaving her alone in the house. Cathy patiently did all the work as she knew it from home already. Cathy prayed hard that her Aunt would send her to school. All her dreams went to ashes when the brother of her uncle came home while she was alone, and sexually abused her in spite of all her struggle to defend herself.



Little did she know that she would become a mother out of this forced act by her relative. The unwanted baby grew in her womb, completing her term of pregnancy, she gave birth to a lovely little girl called Celine (name changed). The neighbors noticed all that was happening to this 13 years old Cathy and how much of suffering she was going through at this age! They came to our home asking us to help rescue Cathy and Celine from this ill treating Aunt.

One day when the Aunt as usual was out at work, we the Sisters went to visit Cathy and we were shocked to see how the little baby Celine was lying in shabby clothes on the floor and sad Cathy sitting next to her with a big question mark on her face. It was very painful to see how little Cathy 13 year old taking care of her baby. We reported to the DCO who rescued Cathy and baby Celine and the court placed them in our home. Cathy was happy and excited. The children in our home welcomed them into the big family. Soon Celine began smiling and eating and became a healthy baby. We enrolled Cathy to school, her long awaited dream and she began her schooling. She is trying her best to cope with her studies and Celine is joyfully growing up in babies ward.

Cathy went through a painful beginning, patiently withstood every hard ship, and today God gave her a new opportunity, a new world of hope, and a safe and secured home surrounded by loving and caring Sisters. God gives each of us grace to face every difficult situation with patience and courage, and He has a place for everyone!

HEALTH CHECK UP CAMP AT SUB JAIL

That



is why we organized this camp to address their medical needs. Many of them diagnosed with diabetic and high blood pressure. The Superintendent, staff and all the inmates were grateful to the Sisters of Anand Vihar for organizing this medical camp for them.


